WELCOME

DEAR REDBIRDS,

Illinois State University is proud to support and encourage membership in sororities and fraternities, as these organizations enrich the campus and local community. The community is home to 11.1% of Illinois State students, a total of approximately 2,100 members across our 40+ chapters. The SFL community retains students at a rate of 90.2% compared to Illinois State's overall rate of 81.4% and graduates members at a rate of 81.7% versus Illinois State's overall rate of 64.5%.

The sorority and fraternity community also supports philanthropic and community service projects for members. Over the course of the past year, members raised over \$160,000 for nonprofit organizations and contributed almost 20,000 hours of community service.

Besides these significant benefits of membership, sorority and fraternity members at Illinois State find a welcoming home away from home, a support network built on values and care, a supportive administrative unit in the University that provides dynamic education and training, and an enriching experience for alumni.

All students are invited to consider membership in a sorority or fraternity at Illinois State.

Why we are Sorority and Fraternity Life

The sorority and fraternity community at Illinois State is rooted in equity and was born from adversity. Sororities and fraternities were not always part of Illinois State. Founded as a teacher's college, the University administration did not see value in having sororities and fraternities on campus. The campus operated under an unwritten rule that banned Greek letter organizations.

In 1942, a group of African American women sought to challenge the status quo by forming a local sorority named Sigma Beta Kappa. When the University administration learned of this initiative, the women were forced to disband and an official policy banning Greek letter organizations was instituted and stayed in place until 1969. One exception was made in 1964, when an individual student was allowed to join the alumnae chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

After the University's stance on sororities and fraternities was reversed in 1969, several organizations formed on campus including Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity, and Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity. The initial community consisted of 12 fraternities and eight sororities and has grown to 42-plus chapters with approximately 2,100 members today. The

administrative unit supporting these organizations is named Sorority and Fraternity Life in honor of the initial group of African American women who challenged the University to support student life from a new perspective.

How to join a sorority or fraternity

General considerations

- All chapters and some councils set specific academic expectations for students who seek to affiliate. The general minimum for membership is a 2.5 GPA. For some experiences, this is a high school GPA, for others, it is a cumulative college GPA.
- Students are eligible to join a sorority or fraternity starting their first semester at Illinois State, though specific organizations may have alternative requirements.
- All organizations can deny membership for questionable moral character. Conduct unbecoming of a member is defined by each organization. Your actions reflect on your ability to join or remain in the community.
- All organizations have financial obligations throughout the entirety of your undergraduate experience, and many last past your undergraduate experience. Some chapters have live-in housing requirements as well.
- Joining a sorority or fraternity is a lifelong commitment, and you should research choices and options before committing.
- It is never too late to join a sorority or fraternity.

UNITED GREEK COUNCIL (UGC)

Member chapters of the <u>United Greek Council</u> (UGC) represent different multiethnic communities. Chapters are affiliated with one of the following

national organizations: National Association of Latino Fraternal Organizations (NALFO), North American Interfraternity Council (NIC), or National Multicultural Greek Council (NMGC). Member selection/intake process varies by organization based on the chapter's need for more members. The process typically starts with an informational meeting followed by a period of membership education designed to teach the history, values, and commitment of the organization. The membership process culminates with initiation into the organization. Most chapters require a 2.5 minimum GPA to participate in membership selection/intake.

Phi Iota Alpha Fraternity, Inc. will be joining the IFC community during the 2025-26 academic year.

Requirements for joining a UGC Organization

- Meet the minimum GPA required for membership of the UGC chapter (2.5 for most chapters).
- Have earned the required number of college credits to affiliate with the organization (this differs from 0-12 or more).

- Demonstrate continual acts of community service and campus involvement, following the example of students who are members of the organization you want to join.
- Attend an informational meeting and meet all requirements of the application and membership intake process.

Helpful hints for joining a UGC Organization

- Find a community service outlet you are passionate about to establish a consistent record of service.
- Research each organization to see who aligns with your personal values.
- Attend chapter events and get to know the members. It is important to have a personal connection.
- Attend an informational meeting. This will give you basic information about the chapter and will allow you to learn about how a particular chapter operates. During an informational meeting, you will also learn about the criteria for membership.
- Watch for advertising. Chapters advertise their informational events on social media and via flyers hung around the campus.
- Be prepared. Member selection and intake is not conducted every semester by every chapter. If you miss an intake period, do not have the required GPA, or are not financially able to join, you may have to wait up to a year or more before the next opportunity becomes available.

NATIONAL PAN-HELLENIC COUNCIL (NPHC)

Member chapters of the <u>National Pan-Hellenic</u> <u>Council</u> (NPHC) are nationally known as the Divine Nine, the historically Black Greek letter sororities

and fraternities. Our campus NPHC is an affiliated chapter of the National Pan-Hellenic Council, founded in 1930 as the governing body of historically Black Greek letter organizations across the country. Member selection/intake is an individualized process that varies by organization. Typically, students can participate in member selection/intake after they have completed 12-24 hours of college credit and earned a 2.5-2.75 GPA.

The chapter determines the member selection/intake process and timeline. The process typically starts with an interest meeting followed by a period of membership education designed to teach the history, values, and commitment of the organization. The membership process culminates with initiation into the organization and a new member showcase where new members are revealed to the community. National Pan-Hellenic chapters and members embrace a lifetime commitment to academic and career achievement, political awareness, and community service.

Requirements for joining an NPHC Organization

- Meet the minimum GPA required for membership in the NPHC chapter (2.5 for most chapters; 2.75 for others).
- Earn the required number of college credits to affiliate with the organization.
- Demonstrate continual acts of community service and campus involvement.
- Attend an interest meeting and meet all requirements of the application and membership intake process.

Helpful hints for joining an NPHC Organization

- Find a community service outlet you are passionate about to establish a consistent record of service. Community service is a staple of the NPHC experience.
- Research each organization to see who aligns with your personal values.
- Attend chapter events and get to know the members. It is important to have a personal connection.
- Attend an informational meeting. This will give you basic information about the chapter and allow you to learn how a particular chapter operates. During an informational meeting, you will also learn about the criteria for membership.
- Watch for advertising. Chapters advertise their informational events on social media and via flyers hung around the campus.
- Be prepared. Member selection and intake is not conducted every semester by every chapter. If you miss an intake period, do not have the required GPA, or are not financially able to join, you may have to wait up to a year or more before the next opportunity becomes available.

COLLEGE PANHELLENIC COUNCIL (CPC)

Most College Panhellenic Council (CPC) chapters are affiliated with the <u>National Panhellenic Conference</u> (NPC). Most organizations either rent or own a house,

which may require members to live-in for a year. Most chapters select new members during the primary recruitment period, which takes place before the start of the academic year. Chapters establish their own GPA requirements, with a recommended minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 from either high school or college. Students will register and pay a fee to participate in primary recruitment during the summer or upon arrival to campus in August. Primary recruitment allows participants to visit each chapter to meet current members and learn more about the organization. Once a student is invited to join a sorority, they will participate in new member education designed to teach the history, values, and expectations of the organization. The membership process culminates with initiation into the organization.

Some chapters will continue to accept new members throughout the fall and spring semesters based on their chapter size.

Outside of the process of primary recruitment, some sororities, based on their chapter size, will be able to participate in continuous open bidding (COB), often called informal recruitment, outside of the primary recruitment period. It is important to recognize that the only way to have an opportunity to join all chapters at Illinois State is to engage in the primary recruitment process, as not all chapters will be able to utilize COB.

Requirements for joining a CPC Organization

- Have a verified 2.5 high school or college GPA to participate in primary recruitment (chapters may have a higher academic requirement to become a member).
- Complete required paperwork and educational programming.

Helpful hints for joining a CPC Organization

- Register for primary recruitment so you can interact with all sorority chapters.
- Research each organization to see which ones align with your personal values.
- Keep an open mind and ask questions to learn about each chapter.
- Meet with the Rho Gammas, current members of the Panhellenic community who have gone through a training process to give support and advice to potential new members during the primary recruitment process.

Member chapters of the <u>Interfraternity Council</u> (IFC) are the oldest fraternal organizations founded on college campuses. While historically created

for white men, today's fraternities accept members from diverse backgrounds. Many IFC chapters are affiliated with the North American Interfraternity Council (NIC). Some organizations rent or own a chapter house which may require members to live-in for a year. Member selection for IFC chapters typically takes place in both fall and spring semesters, and a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 from either high school or college is required. Students are invited to attend council and chapter-sponsored recruitment events and informational sessions that highlight fraternity membership. Once a student is invited to join a fraternity, they will participate in the organization's new member education process designed to teach the history, values, and expectations of the organization. The membership process culminates with initiation into the organization.

The Interfraternity Council (IFC) hosts informal recruitment, which takes place throughout the fall and spring semesters. Each chapter will typically host a series of recruitment events for interested students to learn about the opportunities provided through membership. Students who are interested in joining an IFC fraternity must have a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA.


Zeta Beta Tau is an IFC expansion in the 2025-26 academic year, and Delta Sigma Phi will be joining the IFC community during the 2025-26 academic year.

Requirements for joining an IFC Organization

- Earn a minimum 2.5 cumulative high school or college GPA; some fraternity GPA requirements may be higher.
- Attend recruitment events that are sponsored by the Interfraternity Council to learn more about membership opportunities.
- Complete required paperwork and educational programming.
- Attend chapter events and get to know the members. It is important to have a personal connection.

- Research each organization to see which ones align with your personal values.
- Keep an open mind and ask questions to learn about each chapter.
- Watch for advertising. Chapters advertise their events on social media and via flyers hung around campus.

About unrecognized organizations

Organizations that were once recognized fraternities or sororities at Illinois State University may attempt to continue operations despite losing recognition from the University or inter/national organization. Any operation of these groups is considered underground activity, is against university policy, and is not sanctioned by Sorority and Fraternity Life. Therefore, students should carefully consider the risks of associating with an unrecognized group.

These organizations have had their recognition revoked for various reasons, including hazing, alcohol and drug abuse, risk management violations, and failure to comply with policies and expectations. In almost all cases, these organizations also had their charter suspended or revoked by their inter/national organization because they were not upholding fraternal values and were engaging in risky behaviors that endangered the members and other students. The following groups have lost recognition in recent years for conduct violations:

- · Acacia (suspended through 2028)
- Alpha Sigma Phi (suspended through 2028)
- Kappa Sigma Fraternity (suspended through 2025; university revoked recognition)
- Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity (suspended through 2026; charter suspended by National HQ; university revoked recognition)
- Sigma Lambda Beta International Fraternity, Inc. (suspended through 2026; university revoked recognition)

Membership in recognized organizations vs. unrecognized

A recognized fraternity or sorority meets the standards set forth by Illinois State and the affiliated inter/national organization to operate at the University. All recognized organizations are monitored for compliance with university policies and procedures, receive education and support, and can access university programs and services.

Benefits of joining a recognized organization:

- 1. Interaction with other members of the sorority and fraternity community.
- 2. Access to leadership education and training from the affiliated inter/national organization and Illinois State.
- 3. Involvement in the United Greek Council (UGC), National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), College Panhellenic Council (CPC), or Interfraternity Council (IFC).
- 4. Participation in SFL community-wide events and activities.
- 5. Access to leadership awards and scholarships.
- 6. Ability to apply for a housing exemption to live in a chapter-facility as a sophomore.

Commonly used terms

ACTIVE: A fully initiated, dues-paying, undergraduate member of a sorority or fraternity.

ADVISOR: An alumnus/alumna who serves as a resource for the active chapter and liaison between the alums, university, and collegians.

BADGE/PIN: An item of jewelry given to members upon initiation.

BID: An official invitation to join a Panhellenic or Interfraternity organization given to potential new members.

BID DAY: The last day of Interfraternity Council and College Panhellenic Council recruitment, where potential new members receive formal invitations to join a sorority or fraternity.

CALL: A yell used most commonly by National Pan-Hellenic Council and United Greek Council to identify and greet brothers and sisters. Non-members are not permitted to use the call.

CHAPTER: A branch of a national sorority or fraternity established at a campus. Each will have its own name, usually designated by Greek letters.

CHARTERING: When an establishing chapter receives official recognition from its international office to have a chapter on a campus.

COLLEGE PANHELLENIC COUNCIL (CPC): The College Panhellenic Council is the governing body for the 11 National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) sororities on campus as well as Sigma Alpha.

CONTINUOUS OPEN BIDDING (COB): A process in which an individual can be offered a bid after the formal recruitment process.

CROSSING: Ceremony during which new members of culturally based organizations become active, lifelong members of their organizations.

CULTURALLY BASED: Sororities and fraternities that include the celebration or appreciation of a particular culture.

DRY: A sorority or fraternity which does not permit alcohol on their house premises and, in some cases, does not allow the organization to host an event involving alcohol.

DUES: Monetary costs of membership in a sorority or fraternity used to fund operations, events, and national fees.

FOUNDERS DAY: A day celebrated by sororities and fraternities to highlight the founding of their organization and celebrate its history.

HAZING: Any act performed by a member of any organization that is likely to cause harm or danger, cause public embarrassment or shame, compromise a person's dignity, cause the person to be the object of ridicule, cause psychological harm, or is illegal. Hazing is against the law in all states and is against the principles of all sororities and fraternities.

INITIATION: A ceremony where a new member becomes a full member of the organization. Initiation ceremonies are private and different for all organizations.

INTAKE: Term for the process by which culturally based organizations educate new members.

INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL (IFC): The Interfraternity Council is the governing body for some of the men's fraternities on campus, including those within the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC).

LINE: Term for a group of new members within a Nationial Pan-Hellenic Council or United Greek Council chapter.

NATIONAL PAN-HELLENIC COUNCIL (NPHC): Refers both to the local and national coordinating body for historically African American sororities and fraternities.

NATIONAL PANHELLENIC CONFERENCE (NPC): The National Panhellenic Conference is the organization that governs 26 national women's organizations.

NEOPHYTE: New member of a culturally based organization. Also called a neo.

NEW MEMBER: Term for a person who recently accepted a bid or invitation to membership. Some organizations refer to new members as associate members or line members.

NEW MEMBER CLASS: A group of new members who join at the same time.

NEW MEMBER PERIOD: The time period from receiving a bid until initiation, where the new member learns about their new sorority or fraternity.

NEW MEMBER PRESENTATION: Presentation show for new members of culturally based organizations. Also called a probate.

NORTH AMERICAN INTERFRATERNITY CONFERENCE (NIC):

The North American Interfraternity Conference is the national governing body of a majority of Inter/National men's fraternities.

ORDER OF OMEGA: An honor society for sorority and fraternity members who demonstrate outstanding leadership and academic achievement.

PHILANTHROPY: A charity or fundraiser that the sorority or fraternity supports. Can be national, local, or both.

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER (PNM): A potential new member is a student interested in joining an organization. Also called an aspirant by some groups.

PRIMARY RECRUITMENT: Primary recruitment is the main way of joining a National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) organization. It takes place during Welcome Week in the fall semester on Illinois State's campus.

RHO GAMMA: An active member from one of the 12 Panhellenic chapters who guides PNMs through Primary Recruitment.

RITUAL: A private ceremony of a sorority or fraternity. Also, the formal document that contains the secret principles and ideals upon which the organization was founded. Ritual elements are sacred to each sorority or fraternity and have been handed down through generations.

SALUTING: Saluting is a practice within Lambda Theta Phi Latin Fraternity Inc. and Lambda Theta Alpha Latin Sorority Inc., distinguishing them from other Latino Greek organizations. It encompasses the art of delivering information in a line formation, often referred to as a depiction of "poetry in motion" or a visual story. This practice, usually executed through marching, stomping, and with intensity, is complemented by respectful greetings that pay homage to past and current achievements while honoring cultural history, heritage, and upholding the traditions of the organizations.

STEPPING: Stepping is a form of percussive dance in which the participant's entire body is used as an instrument to produce complex rhythms and sounds through a mixture of footsteps and handclaps.

STROLLING: Also known as "party walk(ing)." An energetic, synchronized dance. Typically, National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) organizational members move together in a line expressing pride for their organization. Emulating or cutting in/through the line is considered a sign of disrespect.

UNITED GREEK COUNCIL (UGC): The United Greek Council is the organization that governs some of the culturally based sororities and fraternities on campus.

Frequently asked questions

When do students typically join a sorority or fraternity?

Member selection/intake varies by organization and council affiliation. NPHC and UGC organizations independently determine when they will consider new members. IFC chapters typically take new members throughout the fall and spring semesters. CPC organizations take in new members before the start of the academic year, and some CPC organizations may take additional new members later in the fall semester and in the spring semester.

How much does it cost to join a sorority or fraternity?

The financial commitment varies by organization. Fees cover inter/national dues, chapter operating expenses, and social functions. There may be additional costs throughout the semester for items such as photos, gifts, apparel, philanthropies, and special events. Students are encouraged to ask about payment plans and scholarships available through the chapter and the affiliated inter/national organization. Average expenses for chapters affiliated with the governing council include:

IFC: \$750 first semester, \$650/semester if living outside chapter facility, \$3,000/semester when living in the chapter facility

NPHC: \$1,250/first semester; \$250 subsequent semesters

CPC: First semester dues: \$1,200; Live-in costs/dues: \$5,350 (per semester; Live out dues: \$970 per semester)

UGC: \$350/semester

How much time is required to be a member of a sorority or fraternity?

Your involvement will fit into your weekly schedule and, as with other student involvement, the more time and effort contributed to the membership experience, the larger the benefits received. Basic membership will consist of one chapter meeting per week, but will not result in much personal growth or the ability to create strong bonds with other members. Participating in other opportunities, such as community service projects, philanthropy events, brotherhood/sisterhood activities, holding a leadership position, etc., will establish relationships and bonds that will last a lifetime. Your sorority or fraternity involvement will fit into your weekly schedule and allow time for classes, coursework, family, employment, and involvement in other student organizations.

Do I need to identify as a student of color to join a NPHC or UGC sorority or fraternity?

No. Chapters within NPHC and UGC are open to students of all ethnic, racial, and cultural backgrounds. The culturally based sororities and fraternities were founded to provide students of color the opportunity to build support systems and relationships that will allow them to succeed at institutions of higher education. Membership in these organizations is open to all students, with education, service, and philanthropic initiatives focused on underserved populations.

Will joining a sorority or fraternity have a negative impact on my grades?

Academic achievement is the foundational value of all sororities and fraternities. Academic standards include maintaining a minimum GPA and academic support initiatives such as tutoring, study sessions, and other programs to assist members. Students who utilize these resources and properly balance their time commitments will find that membership will enhance their academic performance. Studies have consistently found that sorority and fraternity members tend to be significantly more likely to graduate and report more satisfaction with their university experience than unaffiliated students.

Is hazing a traditional practice in sororities and fraternities at Illinois State?

Hazing is any action that produces bodily harm or danger, mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, fright, or ridicule. All national fraternal organizations and institutions of higher education have banned hazing. Illinois State University and the SFL councils rigorously enforce hazing policies, and organizations that violate them are subject to immediate suspension of campus and SFL council recognition and privileges.

The rituals of SFL organizations have nothing to do with hazing; they are not scary, shameful, or degrading. Although rituals are the most important part of membership, it is not hazing.
